Harry Lee Robertson, the former co-owner of Robertson Mobile Homes, has been a long and faithful servant of his community, party, state, and country. Eighty-two years young, Harry was married to the late Mary M Robertson and blessed with one daughter, Jill Robertson and one granddaughter, Kara Moose. A graduate of Stony Point High School, Harry is a Korean War Veteran, having been honorably discharged with the rank of Sergeant.

Following his time as a county commissioner, Harry served on the State Board of Transportation (1985- 88), and then worked as a Deputy Asst. Secretary of the Dept. of Transportation (1988 - 92). Harry was awarded the Order of the Long Leaf Pine by Governor Jim Martin and eventually retire from the DOT in 1994, but not before playing an instrumental role in getting a US Highway re-routed through Alexander County. The new 2D-mile highway was constructed and named in his honor. Kind of makes you smile to know that folks driving to and from Alexander County on US64 every day see
